This month BFI Southbank offers a career overview of one of the most renowned stars of French cinema, including screenings of an extraordinary run of masterpieces *Pépé le Moko* (Dir, Julien Duvivier, 1937), *La Bête humaine* (Dir, Jean Renoir, 1938) and *Le Jour se lève* (Dir, Marcel Carné, 1939)

A marvellously moody crime thriller of the pre-war years, **Marcel Carné's** newly restored classic of 'poetic realism' gave **Jean Gabin** one of his most memorably iconic roles as an army deserter on the run

(Dir, Michael Powell and Emeric Pressburger, 1943) **NEW PRINT 18 – 31 May**
Powell and **Pressburger's** much-lauded satire of the English character has now been restored to its full Technicolor glory by the Academy Film Archive in association with the BFI, ITV Studios Global Entertainment Ltd, and The Film Foundation.
- Vincente Minnelli, Part Two**
The second part of Minnelli's complete retrospective continues this month looking at his later films some of which explore a darker side of life including the psychological drama *The Cobweb* (1955) and **Kirk Douglas** as Vincent van Gogh in the biopic *Lust for Life* (1956).
- Sci-Fi London**
Sci-Fi London continues for its 11th year at BFI Southbank, and has a galactic selection of features, shorts and documentaries including the world premiere of *True Love* (Dir, Enrico

Clerico Nasino, 2012) and provocative documentary **The Mechanical Bride** (Dir, Allison de Fren, 2012).

- **Peter Terson: The Artisan Playwright**

Peter Terson wrote some of the mostly deeply human and controversial dramas of the 60s and 70s. This season explores the range of Terson's TV adaptations of his plays including Play for Today dramas **The Fishing Party** (BBC, 1972) and **Shakespeare or Bust** (BBC, 1973)

Featured Events:

Highlights from our events calendar include:

- A Gala premiere of **All in Good Time** (Dir, Nigel Cole, 2012) on **Tue 8 May + Q&A with cast and crew**, based on Ayub Khan Din's (*East is East*) popular play *Rasta Rasta*; and a preview of **Café de Flore** (Dir, Jean-Marc Vallée, 2011), a powerful and unconventional love story starring Vanessa Paradis on **Wed 9 May**.
- Part of a new BBC2 TV series, **Faster, Higher, Stronger: The Ultimate Race** is a documentary about the story of the 1500m race – the Blue Riband event of any Olympics and features interviews with Olympic 1500m champions Sebastian Coe, Peter Rono and Herb Elliot. There will be an onstage discussion with the filmmakers and some of Britain's past Olympians on **Mon 14 May**.
- During the 1940s, the British Council commissioned a series of documentary films to promote the idea of Britain and 'Britishness'. Preserved by the BFI National Archive, these films are unveiled again on **Thu 3 May** in **Who Were We? The British Council Film Collection Revealed**.
- **The Flipside** presents a rare screening of dystopian cyberpunk romp **Battletruck aka Warlords of the 21st Century** (1981) by director Harley Cokeliss who will be in attendance for a Q&A session after the screening on **Wed 30 May**.
- **Film Funday** presents a preview of **Tales of the Night in 3D (Les Contes de la Nuit)**, directed by **Michel Ocelot**, the master of contemporary French animated cinema on **Sun 13 May**. A Funday workshop precedes the screening giving an opportunity to learn and create silhouette animation.

Seasons at BFI Southbank:

Jean Gabin: Working Class Hero to Godfather

Jean Gabin was the most popular French matinee idol of the pre-war period and remains one of the great icons of cinema. This season gives a complete overview of his career from his early films as the tragic working class hero in the 1930s with such classics as **Le Jour se lève** (Dir, Marcel Carné, 1939); **La Grande Illusion** (Dir, Jean Renoir, 1937) and **La Bandera** (Dir, Julien Duvivier) to a brief sojourn in Hollywood during the war with **Moontide** (Dir, Archie Mayo, 1942) and a high-profile liaison with Marlene Dietrich. By the early 1950s, it looked as if Gabin's era had passed. But then **Touchez-pas au grisbi** (Dir, Jacques Becker, 1954) and **Razzia sur la chnouf** (Dir, Henri Decoin, 1955) re-launched his box-office potential with roles as bourgeois criminal Godfathers after the war. He continued playing charismatic and world-weary (God)father figures in a string of melodramas and gangster flicks until his death in 1976. An added highlight of this season is the extended run of a newly restored print of a classic of 'poetic realism' **Le Quis des brumes** (Dir, Marcel Carné, 1938).

Extended Run: *The Life and Death of Colonel Blimp* from 18 – 31 May

Powell and **Pressburger's** much-lauded satire of the English character has now been restored to its full Technicolor glory by the Academy Film Archive in association with the BFI, ITV StudiosGlobal Entertainment Ltd., and The Film Foundation. Martin Scorsese and film editor and Powell's widow Thelma Schoonmaker Powell have overseen the project since it began in 2008. Based on the satirical cartoon character created by David Low, the film charts the life and loves of one extraordinary man, Major General Clive Wynne-Candy. It's a wondrously witty yet surprisingly sympathetic critical portrait of a man who in his prime was a dashing and daring young officer but became a stuffy and tradition-bound Home Guard 'Blimp'.

Vincente Minnelli, Part Two

Part Two of this complete retrospective showcases Minnelli's later films including the musicals ***Brigadoon*** (1954), ***Kismet*** (1955) and ***Gigi*** (1958), the latter earning Minnelli his only **Oscar**, despite many of his films and actors winning Academy Awards. Amidst the gaiety and glamour of such song and dance, Minnelli also explored a darker side of life with the psychological drama ***The Cobweb*** (1955), which provided Gloria Grahame with an Oscar. ***Lust for Life*** (1956) followed, starring Kirk Douglas as Vincent van Gogh and male tensions rise to violence in ***Home from the Hill*** (1960). As the popularity of musicals waned, Minnelli maintained his levels of perfectionism in more beautifully crafted melodramas and comedies; from the epic family tale of ***The 4 Horsemen of the Apocalypse*** (1962), set in Nazi-occupied Paris, and the gender-swapping ***Goodbye Charlie*** (1964), when **Tony Curtis** is reincarnated as **Debbie Reynolds**, to ***The Sandpiper*** (1965) – a vehicle for **Elizabeth Taylor** and **Richard Burton** – and his last film ***A Matter of Time*** (1976), when his daughter, **Liza Minnelli**, was cast alongside **Ingrid Bergman**. Such later films exemplify the arc of talent and topic that Vincente Minnelli could turn his hand to. He was a true master at bringing a sense of depth and vitality into moving image, lighting up the screen as he did so.

Sci-Fi London

The festival holds its 11th edition at BFI Southbank and Apollo Piccadilly from 1 – 7 May. Heralding the selection of fantastic features, shorts and documentaries at the BFI, Sunday April 29th will see the annual **SCI-FI LONDON Fantastic Costume Parade** bring a collection of the finest movie-and TV-related costumes to the venue. The festival will screen the world premiere of ***True Love*** (Dir, Enrico Clerico Nasino, 2012) written by **'Fabio & Fabio'** (Fabio Guaglione and Fabio Resinaro) the writer-director team behind the hit sci-fi short ***Afterville***; and a preview of documentary of ***Sense of Scale*** (Dir, Berton Pierce, 2011) about VFX artists and model-makers for films. Provocative documentary ***The Mechanical Bride*** (Dir, Allison de Fren, 2012) about state of the art artificial companionships and narrated by screen icon Julie Newmar (*Catwoman* in the Batman TV series) will precede a preview of period Sci-fi drama ***Dimensions*** (Dir, Sloan U'Ren, 2011) on 5 May.

Additional events are **Great Writers in Short Form**, a selection of science-fiction short films, based on short stories by some of the world's great science fiction authors including George Orwell and Kurt Vonnegut; and **Music Video Shorts** a new addition to the festival which highlights music videos with a sci-fi and fantasy theme displaying a real mix of style in both music and technique.

Peter Terson: The Artisan Playwright

Peter Terson is said to belong to the same group of working-class playwrights as Colin Welland or Alan Plater, yet there is a darker psychological strain to his work that sometimes showed an affinity with the work of Pinter. Terson represented the working-class culture of industrial England of the 1960s and 70s, and had an unparalleled ear for naturalistic dialogue and trademark earthy, honest humour shone throughout his plays. He wrote one of the definitive plays about football culture, ***Zigger Zagger*** (1967) during a long and fruitful collaboration with the National Youth Theatre.

This season celebrates his work with a selection of TV adaptations commissioned by the BBC and Granada in the early 70s. Within a period of just four years, they range from dark, psychological explorations of the father-son power struggle in plays such as **Lost Yer Tongue** (Granada 1975) and **But Fred, Freud is Dead** (Granada 1973), to the Pinteresque power games of **Dancing in the Dark** (Granada 1972) and **The Samaritan** (Granada 1972) and the humour and a cute observation of **The Fishing Party** (BBC 1972) and **Shakespeare or Bust** (BBC 1973) & **Three for the Fancy** (BBC 1974) which both continued the adventures of The Fishing Party trio, Art, Ern and Abe; three loveable if naïve miners.

Music plays a leading role in connecting the two stories of Antoine and Carole – a successful DJ and his ex-wife in present day Montreal – and of Jacqueline and Laurent, a devoted single mother and her son with Down Syndrome in Paris in 1969. Carole harbours hopes that Antoine will leave new girlfriend

Rose and return to her and their two daughters. Jacqueline dedicates herself to enriching Laurent's life, but finds her rituals are set off-balance when Laurent meets a young girl who also has Down Syndrome in his class. Memories and moments are woven together to create a powerful story of love

Restoration Premiere: This is Cinerama

Projecting three simultaneous 35mm films on to a huge arced screen with a seven-channel soundtrack, the Cinerama process created a spectacular, immersive cinema experience. *This is Cinerama* was made to showcase its potential, and scenes from La Scala opera house, a rollercoaster ride and a bullfight, amongst others, enthralled 50s audiences. With the original now only viewable in three places in the world, David Strohmaier and Randy Gitsch will present the world premiere of their digital remastering of *This is Cinerama* with a simulated approximation of the real curved screen view Londoners enjoyed at the Casino Theatre in 1954.

We are delighted to preview this new feature-length documentary telling the story of one of Britain's most iconic buildings as the BBC prepares to leave it. The story is told by both staff and stars, among them Sir David Frost, Sir David Attenborough, Dame Joan Bakewell, Jeremy Paxman, Sir Terry Wogan, Esther Rantzen, Angela Rippon, Bidy Baxter, Edward Barnes, Sarah Greene, Waris Hussein, Judith

Hann, Maggie Philbin, John Craven, Zoe and Johnny Ball and much loved faces from Pan's People (Babs, Dee Dee and Ruth) and *Dr Who* (Katy Manning, Louise Jameson and Janet Fielding). TV Preview + Discussion: Faster, Higher, Stronger: The Ultimate Race

BBC 2012. Dir Francis Welch. 60min

With the Games coming to London this summer, this new documentary tells the story of the 1500m – the Blue Riband event of any Olympics. *The Ultimate Race* reveals how the 1500m was the platform for the most famous chapter in British athletics history. In the 1980 and 1984 Games, three British runners – Sebastian Coe, Steve Ovett and Steve Cram – battled it out for Olympic Gold in dramatic races that gripped the nation. Part of the new BBC2 series *Faster, Higher, Stronger*, the film uses rarely-seen Olympic archive material to show how these British athletes are also part of a global tradition. Since the modern Games began in 1896 the 1500m has always attracted the most creative, innovative and exceptional athletes from unexpected corners of the world, from the 'Flying Finns' of the 1920s to today's African high-altitude champions. These runners devised groundbreaking training regimes, pushed human endurance to the limit, and emerged with an unquenchable will to win this most demanding Olympic event. Shot in Kenya, Morocco, Finland, Australia and the UK, the film features new interviews with Olympic 1500m champions including Sebastian Coe, Hicham El Guerrouj, Kipchoge Keino, Peter Rono, Peter Snell and Herb Elliott.

The Roads To Freedom (Complete Screening)

We are delighted to present a very rare complete screening of this remarkable series following the

immense interest generated by the screening of episodes 7,8 and 9 in the season dedicated to the director James Cellan Jones last year. Brilliantly adapted from the novels by Sartre, with writer David Turner managing to capture the complexity and subtle psychological and philosophical twists in the life of Mathieu (Michael Bryant) and his shifting feelings of commitment and alienation as Europe is plunged in to the chaos of war. Nominated for four BAFTAs (Best Writer, Best Production and Best Actor and Actress), the series remains one of the crowning achievements of British television drama.

Who Were We? The British Council Film Collection Unveiled

During the 1940s, the British Council – the UK’s cultural relations body – was an enthusiastic commissioner of documentary films designed to promote an idea of Britain and ‘Britishness’. Over 125 films were produced as cultural propaganda to counteract anything the Nazis might throw out and to refute the idea that ours was a country stuck in the past, and they were seen by millions of viewers in far-flung locations until the late 60s. Now, as we approach the long Olympic summer with the UK’s

self-image in the world’s spotlight again, these fascinating films, preserved by the BFI National

Archive, are revealed once more in an evening of reminiscence, debate and entertainment.

UK 1970. Dir Donald Cammell & Nicolas Roeg. With Mick Jagger, James Fox, Anita Pallenberg, Johnny Shannon. 105min

Mick Jagger compels as the reclusive, decadent rock star whose Notting Hill home is crashed by a hard-nosed gangster on the run in one of the most notorious, inspired and experimental British feature films

ever made – as much about the fluid nature of identity and the very limits of sanity as gang crime and the increasingly illegal status of the late-60s counter-culture. Expecting a Stones equivalent to the Beatles’ *A Hard Day’s Night*, Warner Bros were wary of Roeg and Cammell’s visionary, sex- and drug- fuelled movie, only releasing a cut version after a two-year wait. The full, unexpurgated film screens tonight.

Anger’s Crowleyan magick ritual film features Anton LaVey and a Moog soundtrack performed by Mick Jagger.

The once effectively banned cult action film in which CIA operative Dan Freeman returns to Chicago and prepares his brothers for revolution. This fanciful conceit is both a biting satire and a razor-edged provocation in response to the urgency of its times, and features a highly charged score from Herbie Hancock. This 'not to be missed' rarity screens with a new documentary putting into context an

extraordinary piece of film history: **Infiltrating Hollywood – The Rise and Fall of The Spook Who Sat by the Door** (USA 2011, dir Christine Acham & Clifford Ward, 57min).

King's@BFI: Key Scholars in Film Studies:

Jean Gabin: Anatomy of a Myth

The 'myth' of Jean Gabin is central to understanding popular French cinema. Remarkably, the much-loved star projected – with equal authenticity – both tragic working-class heroes in the 1930s in such classics as *Le Jour se lève*, and bourgeois criminal Godfathers after the war, from *Touchez-pas au*

grisbi onwards. In this illustrated talk, Ginette Vincendeau explores the continuities between the two parts of Gabin's career and the complexities in his projection of charismatic 'ordinariness'. Ginette Vincendeau is Professor in Film Studies at King's College London. She has written widely on popular French cinema Among her books are *Stars and Stardom in French Cinema* (2000), *Jean-Pierre Melville, An American in Paris* (2003) and *La Haine* (2005). She has just completed a book on Brigitte Bardot, and has curated this month's BFI Southbank season of Gabin films

Personal Best

USA 1982. Dir Robert Towne. With Mariel Hemingway, Scott Glenn, Patrice Donnelly. 127min

In anticipation of this summer's Games, here's a rare chance to see Robert Towne's passionate story of a women's track team as they prepare for the 1980 Olympics. Praised for its realistic look at the world of female athletics and the pressures of being the best, at its heart is the complicated love affair between rising star Chris and her older, more experienced teammate Tory. *Personal Best* was at the vanguard of mainstream cinema in the early 80s in depicting a lesbian relationship, and although the film has its critics within the queer community, Chris and Tory's relationship is beautifully handled in the film.

Legendary gay porn pioneer Peter de Rome is revealed in a new film coinciding with the BFI DVD release of *The Erotic Films of Peter de Rome*. Using a Super-8 camera in the 1960s in New York he developed his own style of playful erotica inspired by classic Hollywood and the artful surrealism of

Cocteau. Plus three films by de Rome: pop art fantasy **Mumbo Jumbo** (1972, 16min); boy-meets-boy in **The Fire Island Kids** (1970, 14min); and **Encounter** (1971, 13min), in which a strange force draws men to an empty warehouse in Manhattan.

UK 1947. Dir Redd Davis. With Sid Field, Hal Walters, Betty Lynne. 63min. **PG**

The first film vehicle for the hugely influential Sid Field provides ample evidence of the comic skills he honed over his years in the music hall. This tale of hapless cloakroom attendants who dream of catching spies gives Field ample scope for his distinctive blend of pratfalls, quickfire verbal wit and sheer lunacy, all delivered with impeccable timing.

Saucy fun aplenty in this top-notch cheeky comedy. Cue juicy jazz boys and girls who sing, dance, and do physical jerks in their sun-suits for your delight.

An exciting spy yarn set prior to the war in a Britain seemingly awash with Nazis. When a spy posing as a factory worker steals some top-secret blueprints, he holds out for more money from his Nazi paymasters. Not a wise move. Murder and mayhem ensue (plus a visit to a very seedy night club) as he

tries to keep one step ahead of both the Nazis and the British secret services. Plus **Dual Control** (UK 1932, dir Walter Summers, 20min): Aviators Jim Mollison and Amy Johnson as themselves in a flying drama.

Has modern London ever looked more sinister? The search for an enigmatic piece of archive film takes a lecturer (Dance) and a young researcher (Stuart) into a capital crawling with secrets, wartime experiments and classified information. Poliakoff triumphs in showing the capital afresh and the journey takes us deep into a hidden, subterranean city of disused tram shelters underneath Holborn to the miles of tunnels winding below Oxford Street.

The Flipside: Battletruck aka Warlords of the 21st Century

New Zealand 1981. Dir Harley Cokeliss. With Michael Beck, Annie McEnroe, James Wainwright. 92min. **15**

Hard-nosed vigilante Colonel Straker wreaks high-octane post-apocalyptic mayhem as he cruises the lawless wastelands of 21st-century New Zealand in his enormous armourplated road-beast, the Battletruck. Crushing everything in his path, he and his guffawing cronies terrorise all those who survived the 'Oil Wars'. Except for Hunter – a chiselled biker – who decides enough is enough. Can he turn scared, weary farmers into a viable fighting force and what will he do when he realises the new love in his life is actually Straker's daughter? This little seen dystopian cyberpunk romp is brim-full with 80s-style action, snappy lines and a superb, strident, maniacal villain.

UK 1984. Dir Malcolm Mowbray. With Michael Palin, Maggie Smith, Denholm Elliott, Richard Griffiths, Alison Steadman. 94min. **15**


